JoAnn Belling

"Organizing Yourself, Organizing Your Quilt Room"

Organization in her dream sewing room — plus a discussion of planning and short cuts — will give you an insight to the reason JoAnn is able to create a number of quilt works each year.

JoAnn has enjoyed the sewing machine since she began producing her own clothes at age 12. In 1965 she began quilting with heavy polyester fabrics and no formal instruction. Encouraged by a friend she enrolled in classes in 1977 and has designed numerous quilts and wall hangings.

She has taught a variety of classes in the United States and Japan. Her influence in quilting has been felt from coast to coast. The Belling household has hosted a number of quilt groups for lectures and tours. Her finest work has been reproduced in national publications.

JoAnn has received Best of Show and other ribbons on her quilts at the Iowa State Fair and other competitions. A total of nine quilts have hung at Paducah as well as other national quilt shows. The Quilt Room at Hotel Pattee, Perry, Iowa, is the site for "My Jacobean Garden."



Concepts of color and composition which JoAnn uses in her photographic art are applied to the designing of quilts, borders and quilt backart. All phases of quilting are enjoyed by JoAnn but of greatest interest are the color and design portion.

OCQG Service Committee Opportunities

The OCQG has a long history of community service. Members give freely of their time, talents, and resources to create wonderful quilts and other items for donation to area charitable organizations. The Service Committee coordinates these service projects for our guild. Bring your completed items to any evening meeting where members of the Service Committee will be collecting them. Thank you for contributing to the larger community!

Kay Weiler from our Service Committee notes that they would like to distribute more quilts to the VA but most of the quilts donated are for children. Also some of the larger quilts are more feminine. If you have some fabric that would work for male veterans, they would like to see if they can increase the number of quilts going to the VA (48" by 60").

She has also talked with the staff at 4Cs and they expressed great appreciation for our quilts and burp cloths. The discussion progressed to their mission to help these children with learning letters, numbers, and word association with objects (e.g., B is for Bear). If children's quilts have been donated with letters or numbers, Kay has directed those to the 4Cs and they have been very grateful because their staff have used these to reinforce reading skills.

Items for 4Cs Child Care Center (also see note above) 4Cs is a nonprofit organization based in lowa City that focuses on coordinated child care and operates the Home Ties Child Care Center. Members of the OCQG have been providing bibs, burp cloths, and tote bags on a regular basis for many years.

Bibs for 4Cs. The 4Cs director has told us that they need a big supply of bibs because by the end of each week they often run out. The bibs also wear out quickly because they are washed so frequently. Simple bibs made from a hand towels or washcloths with bias tape ties seem to work well. She says that the kids don't like the ones that go over their heads, so the tie ones are the best.

Hand-Quilting Welsh Quilts

OCQG member Meredith Sewell brings her experience in hand-quilting to the decorative designs of traditional Welsh Quilts. This hands-on workshop incorporates quilting on whole cloth rather than on pieced fabric. Full Kits will be provided including: materials to construct a 36 x 36 inch 'sandwich' of cotton sateen solid fabric front, 'wadding,' as the Welsh would refer to batting, and a patterned fabric backing, quilting needle and thread. Meredith will provide Welsh style quilting patterns in leaves, paisley, spirals and hearts, for you to use to design your own quilting layout. You can also innovate with a layout of your own designs. In Welsh quilting there are no set quilt patterns or designs that everyone follows, and the quilting norm is only 3-4 stitches to the inch due to the heavy nature of the wadding. It's wide open for innovation!

The Workshop fee is \$25.

Quilts for Border Children

We, in Iowa, are far removed from the situation on the border with Mexico but there is something we, as quilters, can do to help the young children at the border. Codi, owner of HomeEc Workshop in Iowa City, is coordinating a project called "Welcome Blankets" to make small (40" x 40") quilts which will be distributed by an organization out of El Paso, TX which works directly with families with small children on both sides of the border. Pam Ehrhardt has a personal connection with a leader in this organization and she will get the quilts to El Paso.

There are several ways you can help with this project:

- donate cotton fabric appropriate for children, including flannel, either yardage or 5" squares,
- donate batting, and/or
- help sew quilts, at your home or at HomeEc Workshop, 424 E Jefferson, Iowa City.
