Dorothy Faidley — "Iowa State Fair Quilts"

Dorothy Faidley will be presenting a program on "Tips and Techniques" for showing quilts at the Iowa State Fair.

Dorothy became superintendent of Iowa State Fair Fabric and Threads in 1982 after the resignation of long time superintendent Jeanette Van Perusem. She had worked in the department since the age of 16 with 8 years off to spend time with her young children.

Fabric and Threads was housed in the east end of the grandstand, then moved to the west end of the grandstand and in 2002 moved to the current space on the second floor of the Varied Industries Building. The category has grown from nearly 800 exhibits to an average of 2000 in the 38 years that have passed. Quilting exhibits have grown in numbers to an all time high of 841 and now average around 700 each fair.

Dorothy grew up in Prairie City, Iowa. She graduated from the University of Iowa and has worked as a nurse for 37 years. She lives on a farm southeast of Colfax where she and her husband Don raised three children, all of them are involved in the fair industry.

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PIECING OUR PAST TOGETHER — WE'RE 40!

The Old Capitol Quilters Guild is celebrating its 40th anniversary in 2021. This is the tenth in a series of articles drawn from the materials collected and preserved by the OCQG Historians, Newsletter Editors, and others that illustrate both how much things have changed and how much is still the same.

The Best Tips and Tricks from 40 Years of the Old Capitol Quilters Guild Newsletter

The first "Tip" I spotted in a newsletter was part of the newsletter editor's notes. "Tips" became a semi-regular feature starting in June of 1985 with them appearing and disappearing over the years. It's interesting to see how our esthetics, interests and quilting methods have grown and evolved over the years. Some of these items would stifle the modern or art quilter, and others seem no longer relevant to the way we work today.

Antique Quilt Care

For those antique quilts that you are too afraid to wash here is the method used by museums to clean their quilts. Lay a clean sheet on the floor and lay the quilt on it. Take a piece of plastic window screen and lay it on the quilt. Now thoroughly vacuum the quilt through the screen. When you refold the quilt fold it in thirds rather than in half. Many old quilts have a permanent crease down the middle from always being folded in the same spot.

June 1992 – Sharon Somers.

Machine Washing Narrow Yardage

Have you ever washed a ¼ yard of fabric and have it come out twisted up like a rope? Often you end up with permanent crease marks. To prevent this all you have to do is fold the fabric in half, pin the layers together with a brass safety pin, and wash. (Brass doesn't rust)

October 2009 – Credit not given.

Nicked Rotary Cutter Blades

If your rotary cutter blade has a nick on the edge and skips threads with every turn, turn the blade over in the rotary cutter and it will often work better.

November 2009 – Credit not given.

Storing Quilts

Roll quilts on "swim noodles" and lay flat for storage. Your quilts will have fewer creases than if folded for storage.

October 2011 — Credit not given.

Choosing Thread Colors

Choose a color of thread that matches the most dominant color in your fabric. If you are unable to find a perfect match, select a thread that is one or two shades darker. Stitches made with a lighter shade of thread will stand out more.

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2019-2020 Challenge

"Quilts with Words"

(To be conducted during our June 14, 2021 meeting)

For this Challenge, you will enter a quilt featuring WORDS. There are many ways to use words on quilts. They can be added with quilting, appliqué, embroidery, piecing, painting, printing, or other media, or they can be pre-printed on the fabric."

There are two categories: SMALL quilt, with no side longer than 40", and LARGE quilt, with at least one side longer than 40". (Example: a table runner measuring 20" x 60" would be a large quilt.)

Here are the rules:

- 1. The quilt must FEATURE words. One or more words must be an essential design element.
- 2. The quilt must be your own work, not purchased or received as a gift or inheritance.
- 3. The quilt must be quilted, bound, and labeled.
- 4. The label must include the following:
 - ♦ your name
 - year of completion
 - name of designer (if not you)
 - name of quilter (if not you)
- 5. It must be entered in the correct size category, as above.
- 6. You must be a paid member of the guild to enter.

Enter your quilt by providing three photographs — a full shot of your quilt, a close-up of your quilt, and a photo of your label. The photos need to be the highest resolution possible if you are using your phone to take the photos. Send the photos to Meredith Sewell, m57sewell@gmail.com by June 7, 2021. This is a firm deadline!

If you are unable to provide the photos yourself, email Mary Mockaitis, <u>marymockaitis@gmail.com</u>, or text her at 319-530-3680, and she will arrange with you to take photos and send them to Meredith by June 7.

Meredith Sewell and the Technology Committee will produce a visual presentation which will be shown during our Zoom meeting on June 14, 2021, when members can view all entries. Voting will take place and winners will be determined for the 2019-2020 CHALLENGE, "QUILTS with WORDS," following the Zoom meeting.

*Each size category will have a Viewer's Choice prize of \$50. In the case of any ties within categories, the Program Committee will break the tie with one vote.

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2020-2021 Challenge:

"Vintage Made New"

To be conducted during our July 12, 2021 Quilt Challenge Tailgater in the Parking Lot at Our Redeemer Lutheran Church

You will be receiving E-Mail Blasts in the near future giving you details on how to enter in the 2020-2021 Quilt Tailgater Challenge "Vintage Made New."

Use the treasures that your Mom, Grandmother, or Aunt have passed down to you. This can be in the form of embroidered pillowcases, tablecloths, doilies, dresser scarves, hankies, laces and trims, even men's ties.

Parts of old quilts or vintage fabrics can also be used.

Any information about the source (e.g., who the vintage items originally belonged to, how they were acquired, stories connected to the items) can be listed in the label.

The size range can be from a fat-quarter size (suitable for a wall-hanging) to a bed-size quilt.

The only restriction is ABSOLUTELY, POSITIVELY, no T-shirts. Let's have some fun with this!!

- 1. The quilt must be your own work.
- 2. The quilt must be quilted, bound, & labeled.
- 3. Your label must include:
 - your name
 - year of completion
 - name of designer (if not you)
 - name of quilter (if not you)
- 4- You must be a current, paid member of the OCQG.

Two Viewers' Choice prizes of \$50 will be awarded. Program Committee will break any ties with 1 vote.

Service Project Quilt Sizes

- Veterans Administration (VA) Hospital: Quilts no larger than 48"x60"
- University of Iowa Hospitals and Clinics (UIHC): Quilts (colorful) 40"x40" and stillborn quilts no larger than 36" by 36"
- -- UIHC Child Life Program: Quilts (colorful) 45"x45"
- -- Domestic Violence Intervention Program
 - (DVIP): Quilts 75"x98" (twin/single) or smaller
- Houses into Homes: Quilts, bed size (twin, full, queen), especially gender-neutral fabrics
- **4Cs Community Coordinated Child Care:** Small quilts (approximately 40"x40"), tote bags and bibs (see details below)
- -- Visiting Nurse Association: Burp cloths

Items for 4Cs Child Care Center

4Cs is a nonprofit organization based in Iowa City that focuses on coordinated child care. It operates the Home Ties Child Care Center. Members of the OCQG have been providing bibs, burp cloths, and tote bags on a regular basis for many years.

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
Have fabric scraps to donate for pet beds?
